## Bits of bitz

It is with gratitude that I acknowledge two unique gifts to the Jamestown community and surrounding territory: St. John's Academy—a Christian, Catholic School—and Jamestown College—a Christian School. Both of them blessed us with their music programs held here at the Basilica in the last two weeks. Both of them helped us to focus on Jesus, the Son of God, coming into our midst. They helped us to focus on the Christian meaning of Christmas. In the midst of our present struggles, they once again—as they have done for many years—embedded the Christ in our hearts through music. We thank God for this great gift.

The power of nature is amazing. This past week we were the victims of snow and cold and wind. We had a sign in our church yard with the times of our Christmas Eucharists. We had it made with the intention of using it for years to come. However, we had it up for a few days when nature did its trick. The cold made the vinyl very brittle. Then the gusts of wind up to 51 miles per hour took that sign. We looked for it around the neighborhood and accepted the fact that it probably was buried underneath one of the big snow drifts. I just found out that the sign has been chopped to pieces—the street crew was blowing the snow onto trucks when suddenly a “rug” went through their blower. Our sign has been ground up into hundreds of pieces. I guess we can use it as a symbol. As followers of Christ, we are to go by the hundreds into our neighborhoods as the Light and Love of Christ.

As a baptized people we rejoice in Christ become one

of us. We rejoice that he is using us to bring the good news that heaven and earth have been wedded. We rejoice that through us God is bringing the good news of justice and peace on this earth and resurrected life in heaven.

As a church we are the Body of Christ. Still as humans we are weak and we fail to be what we really are. I am encouraged by the great Italian spiritual writer: “How much I must criticize you, my church, and yet how much I love you! You have made me suffer more than anyone and yet I owe more to you than to anyone. I should like to see you destroyed and yet I need your presence. You have given me much scandal and yet you alone have made me understand holiness. Never in this world have I seen anything more compromised, more false, yet never have I touched anything more pure, more generous or more beautiful.... Countless time I have felt like slamming the door of my soul in your face – and yet, every night, I have prayed that I might die in your sure arms! No, I cannot be free of you, for I am one with you, even if not completely you. Then too – where would I go? To build another church? But I could not build one without the same defects, for they are my defects. And again, if I were to build another church, it would be my church, not Christ's church. No, I am old enough, I know better.” An ode to the church by Carlo Carretto, the Italian spiritual writer, who loved the church deeply but was honest enough to admit its faults. Fr. Ron Rolheiser says: “That's an insight that can help all of us, both those of us who are going to church and those of us who aren't.”

## Preparation for Catholics celebrating the Sacrament of Marriage

Timothy Muldoon in "A Theology for Married People" says: "U.S. Catholic pastoral leaders are ill advised to assume that there is a consistent, systematic belief among their congregants that marriage is the natural course for many young lay people, or that those who are married will stay that way or that children will be raised in Catholic households with two parents."

Marriages witnessed by the Catholic Church are sacraments. The Church sets up the homes of people getting married as domestic churches or "little churches." It ordains husbands and wives to be the sacramental ministers. This means that Christ identifies His love with their love. Whenever they say: "I love you," it is Christ who is saying that. Whenever they say: "I forgive you," it is Christ who is saying that. This has its equivalent when the priest says: "This is my Body...This is my Blood." When the priest says that, we as Catholics know it really is Christ saying that. So it is with husband and wife. The love they have for each other then makes visible and present God's love. Their family becomes holy by husband and wife living out daily their marriage vows. This means that living out their sacramental marriage vows is their way of holiness. As Timothy Muldoon says: "Married life is the privileged place of encounter with God, the holy ground upon which God invites them to work out their

salvation and the salvation of their spouses, children, extended families and communities".

Because it is a sacrament, the Catholic Church requires that a priest (or another minister specifically delegated by the Bishop) be present to witness the exchange of vows. This means that normally the marriage of a Catholic takes place in a Catholic Church in the presence of a priest and two witnesses. However, for specific reasons a Catholic can be married in another Christian Church with its minister presiding after a special dispensation from the Bishop. However, such a couple must meet with a priest to do the proper paperwork and to make sure all the church's preparation requirements are fulfilled. The Church encourages the priest and the minister to work together in preparing such a couple. The Bishop then grants a dispensation so the Catholic and Christian spouse can sacramentalize their marriage in a non-catholic Church and witnessed by the minister of that church.

If the above is all done, we publish the proposed wedding in our bulletin so everyone knows that all the requirements of the Catholic Church have been met and that the marriage is a valid, sacramental marriage. In a nutshell: whenever a Catholic gets married, he/she must always visit and work with a priest, deacon or pastoral minister.

## Sacramental Celebrations at St. James

The General Policy of The Basilica of St. James flows from our theology of Church.

The Church expresses fully and uniquely who she is when she celebrates the Sacraments. The Sacraments are the Acts of the Church, the Acts of Christ. This is who we are.

Therefore there are no fees connected with these Core Acts of the Church. Often there are donations associated with these, but they are donations. They are gifts whether they are given to the Presider at the sacrament (baptism and marriage or at a funeral) or whether it is a gift to the Church. Often a gift is given to the Tabernacle Society for serving the luncheon at a funeral or at a wedding. Thus for Sacramental celebrations we invite people to use the facilities of the Basilica of St. James (whether it is the Parish Center or the Zebedee Center or the Cafeteria) for gatherings, dinners/lunch, etc. with no fee.

Thus we invite a baptismal family to use our parish center and/or Zebedee center and there is no fee

Thus we invite first reconciliation, first communion, and confirmation families to use our parish center and/or Zebedee center and there is no fee.

Thus we invite ordinations to diaconate or priesthood to use our parish facilities and there is not fee.

Thus we invite wedding families to use our parish center and/or Zebedee center and there is no fee. We also want to celebrate the dignity of married life (the domestic church), the permanency of marriage and thus invite families to have their wedding anniversaries here and there is no fee. In this way we show forth the dignity of family, of little church.

Stewardship is what supports the church and allows it to be and express itself in Ministry. This means we really develop a stewardship mentality and spirituality. We contribute of our Time, Talent, and Treasure so that the Church can be Church uniquely in celebrating the Sacraments, a time when the generous Love of God is manifested. That is where we will focus our attention in the coming years. This is why the Scriptures speak of Tithing.
