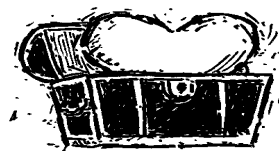

CATHOLIC CHARITIES

Catholic Charities will once again be accepting applications for its *Bridge to Your Future* Program. *Bridge to Your Future* is an intensive program designed to help those who live in Camden County and are struggling to manage their finances and who have needed the assistance of charities or public agencies in the past.

Those who are accepted into the program must demonstrate a high degree of motivation and strongly desire to rely on their own abilities to manage their financial lives.

Applicants are asked to set goals which could include learning how to get out of debt, improving job seeking skills, passing the GED in order to be eligible to earn more money, and even home ownership. Each person selected to participate in the program will be assigned a case manager who will coach and counsel them along the way. *Bridge to Your Future* involves a big commitment of time and energy (weekly phone calls, monthly appointments, and attendance at workshops), but for those who participate, the rewards can be great.

A FRESH PERSPECTIVE ON THE SUNDAY READINGS

HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly

"For you know the gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, for your sake He became poor, so that by His poverty you might become rich. Not that others should have relief while you are burdened, but that as a matter of equality your abundance at the present time should supply their needs, so that their abundance may also supply your needs, that there may be equality."

We do not need an expert to tell us that we are experiencing a recession, or depression. The world which surrounds us shouts out that our lives have changed and people are hurting. No one can escape its effects in one way or another. Pension plans, foreclosures, termination of businesses, rising prices are part of lived reality.

Paul's message to the Corinthians can be a lesson in reality for us all, as we discover ways to meet the difficult circumstances which surround us. We are summoned not to feel sorry for ourselves, but look at the suffering endured in so many places in the world, where starvation reigns, wars abound and suffering flourishes. We have not done our best to arrest the spread of disease, the evil of arms sales, the genocide which has forced millions to flee their homes.

The letters of John 23RD, the encyclical of Pope Paul VI *On the Development of Peoples*, the peace pastoral and letter on the economy of the United States Bishops and the challenges of the Latin American Bishops of a 'fundamental option for the poor' speak to the issues which touch us today.

As Paul speaks, the teaching of the beatitudes in Matthew's gospel allows us to examine our consciences. Although we experience some hurts, we remember that brothers and sisters are in the same struggle and have been for an extended period of time. Together may we work with them to ease the burden and sufferings of all.

First Reading: Wisdom 1: 13-15; 2:23-24

This reading relates how death of the spirit entered the world by the envy of the devil, but those not in his possession will not experience it.

Second Reading: II Corinthians 8: 7-9, 13-15

Paul exhorts the Corinthians to contribute to the poor of the Jerusalem church in accordance with their means. He explains that if people help each other, they will one day be helped when they are needy.

Gospel: Mark 5: 21-43

"Do not be afraid, only have faith." Jesus' power over sickness and death requires absolute trust and absence of fear.
