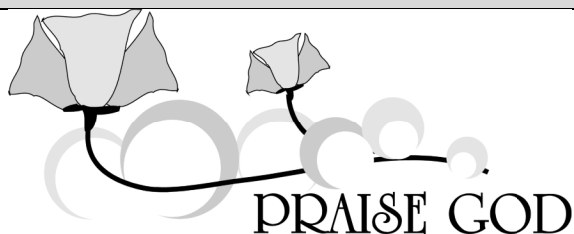

LITURGY



First Reading: Daniel 12:1-3

Daniel discusses the end of the world, a time when the dead shall rise and everyone will be judged. He warns that some shall "be an everlasting horror and disgrace." But he promises that some will live forever, and the wise will shine brightly to lead others to justice.

Second Reading: Hebrews 10:11-14, 18

Priests repeatedly offered sacrifices that were unable to take away sin. But through Jesus' one sacrifice, our sins were forgiven, leaving no need for other offerings.

Gospel: Mark 13:24-32

Jesus told his disciples that many signs would be seen before the end of the world. He explained that the earth would pass away but his words would not. He also told them that neither the angels nor himself, but only his Father knew when this would take place.

REFLECTIONS ON READING

First Reading: Daniel 12:1-3 This reading proclaims that the wise and "those who lead the many to justice" will receive a reward. What is that reward? Can you name anyone you know whom you consider to be wise? Who do you know that is just? Can you name anyone who "leads the many to justice"? How can you become more like them?

The writer compares these people to the stars in the sky. Why do you think good and just people are like stars? (Hint: one reason might be that stars "point us in the right direction." Can you explain this?)

Second Reading: Hebrews 10:11-14, 18

Take a moment to think back on the past year. How have you grown? What do you look forward to in the future? Ask God today to guide you. God is our hope.

Gospel: Mark 13:24-32 One day, Saint Thomas Aquinas, the great teacher and philosopher, and his Dominican brothers were gathered for their hour of recreation. They were all talking, laughing, and enjoying one another's company before going back to their work, prayer, and study. Someone asked Saint Thomas, "If the world were to end in fifteen minutes, what would you do?" He replied, "I would continue doing exactly what I am doing right now."

Why do you think Saint Thomas said this? How can you be ready for Jesus to come again?

Dear Friends,

Happy Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time! We continue walking gratefully through the beautiful month of November with a Reflection on our Sunday scriptures, a Ritual to help us live the present fully and lovingly and a few Reminders about some important activities which can help us truly live our faith peacefully, day by day...

Reflection: In these last weeks of the liturgical year, as the civic calendar also draws to a close, we look to the end of all things, the Second Coming of Christ. The prayers and readings this weekend blend fearful imagery of the end times with cause for hope—a merciful God and a gracious Savior. In the first reading, Daniel began with terror, about a time unsurpassed in distress, but it ended in hope, *the wise and the just will shine like stars*. In Mark's gospel, Jesus begins with very powerful images...everything will change, he said, the sun, moon and stars will all darken. Into this darkened world, Jesus will burst into glory. Jesus then turns to a humble image every one of his disciples would have been familiar with: the blossoms of a fig tree. When they see new shoots forming and sprouting leaves, they all know that summer is on its way. In the same way, they will know the end is coming by sure signs. The purpose of these vivid descriptions is not to terrify the followers of Jesus into good behavior, but to rekindle the fervor of disciples, who grew weary of waiting. Every time we pray the Our Father, we say...Thy kingdom come...are we really ready for it? Do we help to create the beginning of that kingdom here on earth, a kingdom of justice and peace and love? If the answer is yes, then we are accepting our call, our challenge and our consolation. We will be living each day...each week...each year...each decade in peace, waiting in joyful hope for the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Our fervor too will be rekindled! Next weekend we celebrate our parish feast of Christ the King, a clear reminder of this powerful message!

Aware of the presence of your God, reflect: What is your attitude toward **Now?**

Are your **Nows** never here, but generally in the past or in the future?

Do you enjoy **Now?**

Now, how do you want to live? You and your God think about it together.

Ask God about your **Now!** Then, with God's help, live it

Reminders: Let's try to memorize these few lines from today's Responsorial Psalm, 16, and remind ourselves of his loving presence in our lives each day:

I set the Lord ever before me; with him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed.

You are my inheritance, O Lord! Therefore, my heart is glad and my soul rejoices,

my body too, abides in confidence, because you will not abandon my soul...

You will show me the path to life and fullness of joys in your presence,

the delights at your right hand forever!
